Notable Cases

R v M [2022] – Benefit fraud. No evidence offered following an application to exclude evidence on account of a vulnerable defendant not having access to an appropriate adult in interview.

R v G [2022] – Secured acquittal via a successful application to dismiss in a revenge porn case.

R v N [2022] – Represented a vulnerable Defendant who required an intermediary for a trial in the magistrates. Secured the acquittal of one of three counts of assault.

R v M [2022] – Successfully defending an exceptional hardship argument for a father of three who faced losing his licence.

R v J [2022] – Successful prosecution of an appeal against conviction for exposure.

R v G [2022] – Successful prosecution in a burglary case in the magistrates involving disputed identification evidence and extensive CCTV.
